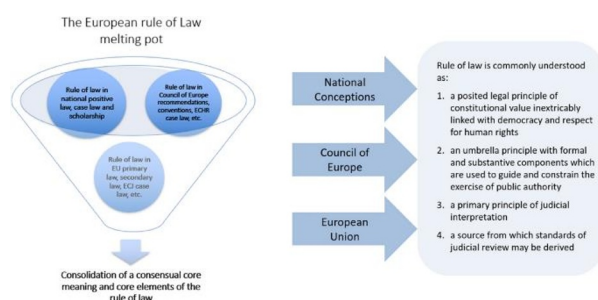


Fig. 1. T Principles of rule of law in new judicial model.

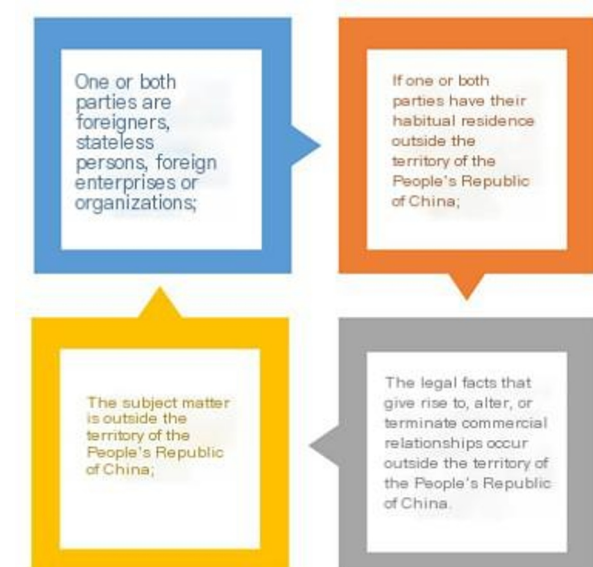


Fig. 2. Principles of international cooperation in the new judicial model.
