One of the most notable practices of Novo Nordisk is the establishment of an independent business ethics committee responsible for evaluating and promoting the company's compliance culture, ensuring that the compliance system is aligned with the company's goals. The committee comprises senior management and independent members and is accountable to the board of directors. In addition, Novo Nordisk has introduced a compliance hotline for employees to report inappropriate behavior, ensuring anonymity and protecting whistleblowers from retaliation.
